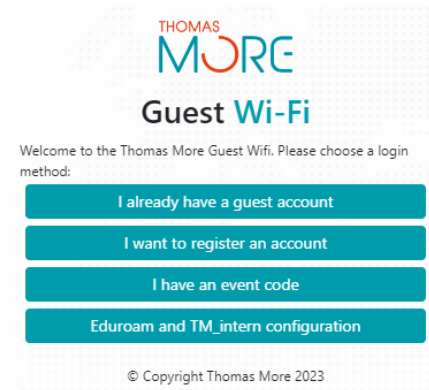

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# Workshop Abstracts

**Monday 14 August**

## **Exploring the impact of Globalization on local SLP approaches**

### **Workshop 1: Share book reading outreach activities**

*prof. dr. Jean Torng*

Share book reading activities have been an important activities for facilitating child's language development and promoting emergent literacy skills. In this workshop, the share book reading outreach activities in Taiwan will be discussed, and student participants will then invited to share their activities in their countries. The similarity and different way to promote language skills will be analyzed. In addition, story books with different genres, linguistic elements and instruction methods will be also discussed. After completing this workshop, participants will be able to describe between ways of doing share book reading activities and the important of such activities for language development and emergent literacy skills.

### **Workshop 2: Playful communication**

*mrs. Annemieke van Ravesteijn,*

Real profound contact between people in communication is a condition for human happiness and quality of life. Globalization brings a chance of communication between cultures, but in different cultures communication will be different. However, people will find each other in play, sometimes in unexpected ways.

Creativity, humor and non-verbal communication in play can be used to make communication possible in stead of difficult.

In this workshop students will communicate through exercises and techniques of applied improvisation and contact-clownery (for example cliniclowns or clowndoctors). These learning experiences will especially focus on making communication and contact. Students will not learn to be a clown, but they will learn to use techniques out of this workfield in their own work als SLP and in communication with people from over the world. Learning outcome will be that students can use these techniques to communicate with colleagues and partners all over the world, but also with patients, like people with a mental deficit or small children.



## Wednesday 16 August

### Becoming an EBP-skilled SLP professional

#### **Workshop 1: Just another number**

*dr. Francois-Xavier Brajot*

An often neglected step in the EBP process is evaluating how important the evidence actually is. A study may prove to be valid and reliable and be considered “high-level evidence” (e.g. meta-analysis), but this does not address questions of benefit, harm, and cost-effectiveness in a specific clinical setting. This tutorial will guide students through an in-depth analysis of a systematic review and some of the article included in the review. Students will be introduced to concepts of binary classification (e.g. sensitivity, positive predictive value). They will work through two or three papers, then reach a decision as to whether the assessment tools are worth incorporating into their clinical setting (actual or hypothetical).

#### **Workshop 2: Know your apps**

*mrs. Anna Krispin & mrs. Jessica Frembgen*

In this interactive workshop, we will explore the possibilities of evidence-based practice in the use of apps for health, prevention and well-being. You will have the opportunity to learn about the latest research and evidence-based approaches regarding apps in SLP. You will engage in interactive activities to explore the potentials of app-based health interventions and leave with a better understanding of how to effectively use apps in SLP.

#### **Workshop 3: What's an evidence based assessment?**

*mrs. Lorraine Lieffrig*

We are used to hear about evidence based for the SLT treatments. But what about evidence based assessment? How to make sure my patient has the good diagnostic? Is the tool I use well designed for what I want to evaluate? Among all the assessment tools, how to select the “best one”? What should I pay attention to when selecting an assessment tool? Why are the previous questions important? But why is it complicated to base our assessments on evidences?

## **Workshop 4: Working with clinical guidelines**

*mrs. Loes Venema*

First part: Short recap of what the students already learnt in the introduction lecture about what are clinical guidelines and what is the role of the guidelines. The difference between clinical guidelines and protocols will be discussed. After that, we will make the link between theory and clinically using the guidelines. As a fluency specialist, I use the Dutch guidelines for fluency; I will explain how I use the guidelines and give examples on how I use them in my daily practice.

Second part: After this, the students will work in groups to make a poster/presentation answering the following questions:

- What are the benefits of clinical guidelines?
- What are the downfalls of clinical guidelines?
- What are other options to improve quality of care?
- Which guidelines are used in your country? Do you have experience with it? What is your experience with using clinical guidelines?

Third part: The students present their findings in the poster or with a PowerPoint presentation.

Fourth part: Discussion + what are the things the students learnt or take home with them. The goal is that students can make the link between the evidence-based theory of the clinical guidelines and clinical practice.
